Student Services - February 2022



Testing - In April, all 9th and 10th grade students will take the PSAT, and all 11th grade students will take the SAT. While these are state mandated tests.... they do allow our 9th/10th to experience a standardized testing situation before taking the SAT. The 11th grade SAT state mandatedtest allows all students to have a college reportable score, which can open up the college door for our students.



FAFSA -

The FAFSA is now open for the graduating class of 2020 to fillout. The FAFSA determines the amount of financial aid (loans,grants, scholarships, etc) that your student may be eligible for. The priority deadline for Michigan students to receive optimal consideration is March 1st, 2022..... but don't wait until then.



Seventh Semester Transcripts – If you need to have your transcript sent to a college or university because they want to see your grades from last semester, you need to request it through parchment.

Dual Enrolled Students – 1st **Semester** Once you have completed your dual enrolled course, you are responsible for turning in a copy of your final grade to Ms. McGraw, ELHS registrar.

Dual Enrolled Students – 2nd Semester It is your responsibility to make sure that we have the correct course on your paperwork that you end up taking. If you change your mind and don't let us know, your family will receive a bill for the full amount of tuition for the course.



Admissions Decisions - Many universities will be releasing admissions decisions to students over the holiday break. In many cases, students will receive an offer of admission which should be a cause for celebration.

In other cases, students may receive notification that the decision has been deferred and that the University would like to see grades from the 7th semester. If your student gets this notification.... it is not a cause for panic. The University is simply interested in taking into consideration the student's 1st semestersenior grades as part of their admissions decision process. This is a very common practice as Universities are making sure that they accept students that are a good fitfor their incoming student body.

Students may also receive a letter from the University of their dreams that does not offer up admission. Often times this news does not settle well with our teens, especially when all of their envisioned future plans have them strolling through that campus this fall. We would like to encourage families that have this happen in their home to remind their students that a denial from this particular University does not mean they have less of a chance of living a happy life. This is a wonderful opportunity for them to build a great life at another school. Plan B (or C, or D, or E) can bring just as many great opportunities as what they hoped Plan A would bring.



College Board Account - Students should make themselves a student account at the www.collegeboard.com (SAT/PSAT). This is where they will manage theirtest results, have access to test

prep, and have access to career and college exploration. The college/career exploration features are topnotch... and can be very helpful for students trying to figure out where their next journey will take them.

During the Test


You will be allowed to have only these items on your desk:

- A test book
- An answer sheet
- No. 2 pencils with erasers
- An approved calculator—during one of the math sections only
- Turn Off All Electronic Devices
- You'll need to turn off all electronic devices during the test and even during breaks. This includes cellphones. Be sure to turn off your watch alarm, if you have one.
- Why? Test centers are serious about security and quiet, so prohibited devices—which include cellphones, tablets, and MP3 players—must be turned off and put under your desk. Better yet: Leave them at home.
- Important:
- Really, Really Important
- You will be dismissed immediately and your scores will be canceled if you use your phone or if it makes a noise—even during breaks. Your phone may also be confiscated and inspected.
- Share Your Email Address

East Lansing High School Spring 2022 Conferences will be held virtually <u>on Thursday</u>, <u>March 10th and Tuesday</u>, <u>March 15th</u>, <u>2022 from 2 p.m.</u> – 4 p.m. and 5 p.m. – 7 <u>p.m.</u> The scheduling window will open to parents on Monday, February 28th at 8:00am and will close Wednesday, March 9th at noon.

To schedule your preferred time for a parent-teacher conference:

- 1. Go to https://www.myconferencetime.com/demo/searchschool/
- 2. Click on the name of your child's teacher.
- 3. Select the desired date/time for your conference by clicking on "Sign Up."
- 4. Submit the requested information. Make sure you leave at least 5 minutes in between conference times.

If you have several children attending our school, click on "Register for Multiple Conferences" and follow the prompts to schedule your children for several conferences.

After you schedule a conference online, the date and time are reserved for you. *If you* entered your email address correctly, you will receive email confirmation of your conference. Your Zoom and passcode information will be on your confirmation.

If you need to review your conferences, go to https://www.myconferencetime.com/demo/searchgroup/?school=east+lansing&searchbutton=Find+a+School+or+Group. On the bottom of the page you will notice a gray task bar. Click on "Help me find conferences that I already scheduled." It will prompt you to enter your email address. Then you will notice in your inbox, a note from the company. If you open that email there will be a link. Click on the link and your schedule will appear in order of time and teacher.

If you are unable to sign up for a time and date online, you are welcome to come into the main office at the ELHS and use a computer to schedule your conferences or send a note with three preferred times and dates to your child's teacher. Once the teacher receives your note, he/she will attempt to schedule a conference for your desired date and time but cannot guarantee your top choices as time slots fill up quickly.

Scholarships

Colleges will tell the student about some of the need or merit based scholarships they are eligible for at the institution. However, colleges don't always list all of the scholarships that students receive. Especially if the student receives a scholarship from outside of the school (for example, the Lansing Promise Scholarship). It's important that students continue looking for scholarships throughout their college years, even after they have received their financial aid award letter. Students can look at the college website for more scholarships, or use websites like FastWeb, Cappex, or community/school based scholarships. CapCAN even has our own list of scholarships that combine local, state and national resources. Remember, scholarships are free money that the student will not have to pay back.

Grants

Grants can come from the federal government, like the Pell Grant. They can come from the state government, like the Michigan Tuition Grant. Or they can also come from the college itself. Grants are a form of free money that students will not have to pay back, and they are typically need based.

Work Study

Work Study is another way for students to help cover costs while at college. Work Study is not applied to the tuition and housing amounts, but is instead meant to help students cover the day to day costs, such as buying essentials, books, transportation, etc. Students typically can apply for campus jobs in the Work Study program. If students are eligible and accept work study on the financial aid award letter, they will still need to apply to different jobs on campus. The

checking both of these at least once a week. If after a few months, a student has not received their financial aid award letter, reach out to the school to see if there are any missing documents in their FAFSA or institution profile.

After receiving the financial aid award letter, students will need to go through and manually accept their aid package. Often scholarships and grants will automatically be accepted (but it's still good to check), but students and parents will have to manually accept or deny loans. It's important to know that students and parents SHOULD NOT take out the full amount of the loans if they don't need all of them. If the student is unsure of this process, please have them reach out to the financial aid office to help clarify any confusion.

Reviewing and comparing the financial aid award letters are an important step in the college-going process. If a student can't make a decision on what college to attend, they can use this to decide which college will be the most affordable. It is still important to be critical of this document though. In order to attract more first year students, colleges will often offer grants and scholarships that they can only receive during their first year. It's important when making decisions about college, that the student understands that they may not receive the same amount of free money every year. Students must apply for scholarships and FAFSA every year they are enrolled in college.

If a student feels like they are not receiving enough financial help from the college, they benefit to work study is that students won't have to work too many hours and their employer will work around their school schedule. It also gives students a way to meet new people on campus and build their resume.

Loans

When looking at loans on the financial aid e award letter, it's important to understand the different types of loans. If a student is offered a subsidized and/or unsubsidized federal

Most financial aid award letters will come through the college's student portal (like the Banner system at LCC) or in their college email. It's important that students are loan, it means students will not have to start repayment until 6 months after the student graduates or leaves school. The difference in these loans is that subsidized loans do not accrue interest while the student is in college (but will begin accruing interest after the student leaves the school), while unsubsidized does accrue interest while the student is in college. Both of these loans are meant for the student to take out. Another common loan to be listed on the financial aid award letter is a parent plus loan. These are loans specifically meant for parents to take out. If parents qualify for the loan and take it out, they will have to make payments on the loan while the student is in college.

can submit an appeal at their intended college's financial aid office. There are many times that financial hardships are not captured on the FAFSA particularly this year due to the pandemic. If a parent has experienced a lost job, change in income, high medical bills, etc., the financial aid office might be able to help out if students disclose these problems.

If students are feeling overwhelmed by this process, encourage them to reach out to their School Counselor, or call the financial aid office. Misunderstanding financial aid packages should not be a barrier for students to attend college. CapCAN is committed to making sure our students and families understand all of the financial resources available to them.





Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Resources

There are 104 Historically Black Colleges and Universities in the United States according to the US Department of Education. They were created prior to the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to provide higher educational opportunities for black male and female students who were historically and legally excluded from attending all-white and predominantly male institutions. HBCU's include both private and public institutions with a rich history of providing high quality postsecondary credentials to black Americans and others committed to equity.

Lansing also has a rich history of helping students explore their options at HBCU's with an annual HBCU College Fair, scholarships, and tours of HBCUs. If you or a student you know is interested in attending an HBCU, these resources are helpful to start the process.
